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In geography lessons I learn about the world and its features. Features are the things I can see and feel around me when I look outside.	Nature is the natural world – Things that would exist even if there weren't any people. In geography, features made by nature are called 'physical features'. Examples of physical features are; Forest, hill, river, soil, vegetation, weather, field. Vegetation means plants growing in one place (share photos).	Each year has four seasons - called spring, summer, autumn and winter. Each season has different weather. Season and weather are physical features of our world (things we can see and feel when outside.) Some physical features will look different depending on the season. e.g. A winter forest vs a summer forest. An empty field vs a field with vegetables growing. A flooded river vs a dried-up river.	Features are the things I can see and feel around me when I look outside. In geography, features made by people are called 'human features'. Examples of human features are; Town, village, farm, house, office, shop, school, road, path, church, carpark.	The environment is everything around us.
