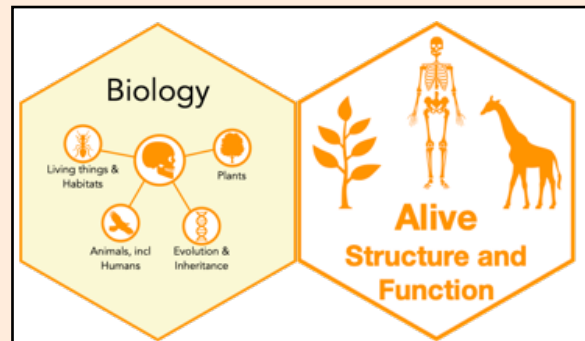


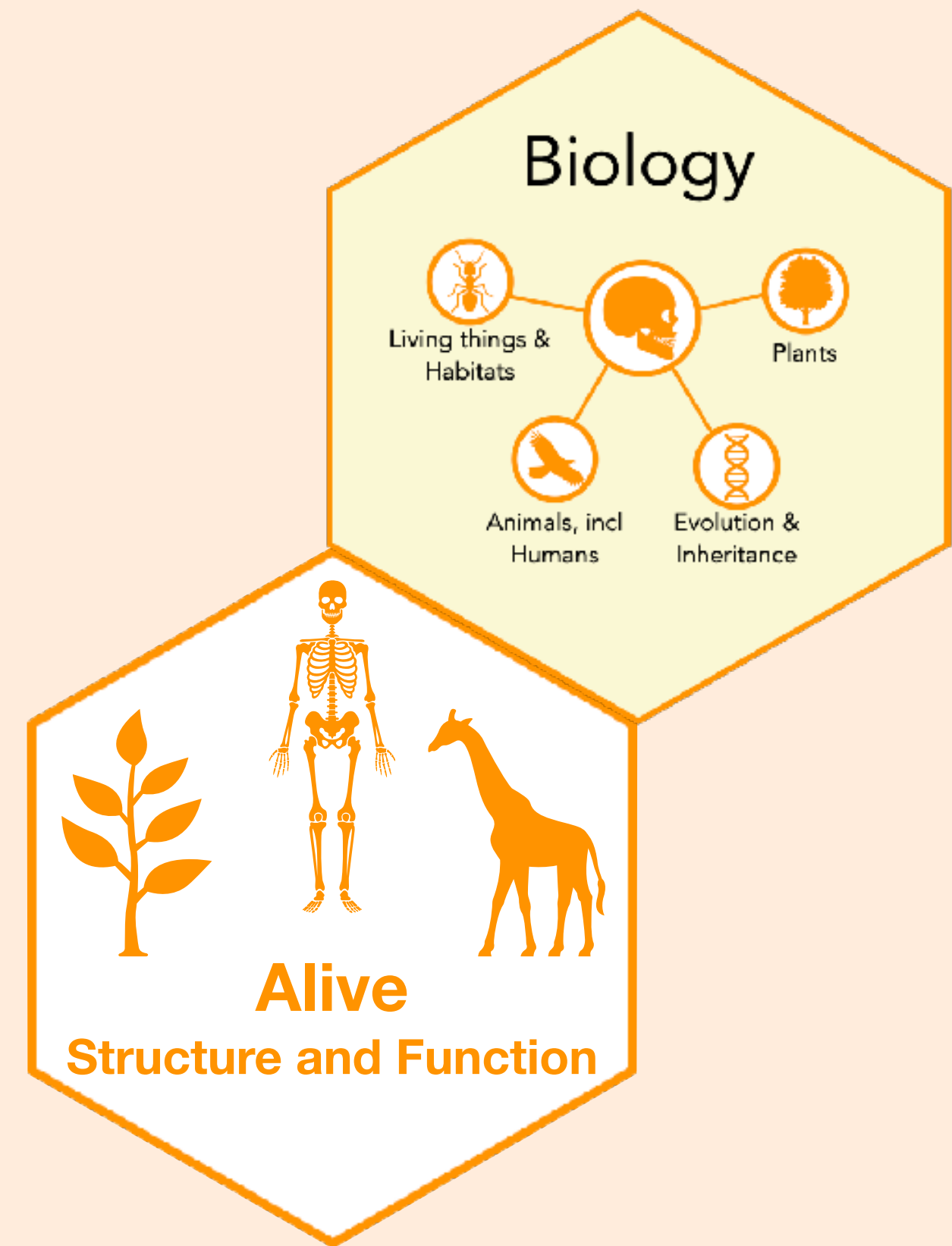

Biology Key Concept: Alive (structure)	
<u>Organisms are organised on a cellular basis and have a finite life span</u>	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>All organisms comprise one or more <b>cells</b>.</li> <li>Multi-cellular organisms have cells that are <b>differentiated</b> according to their function.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>All the <b>basic functions of life</b> are the result of what happens inside the cells that make up an organism.</li> <li>Growth is the result of multiple <b>cell divisions</b>.</li> </ul>

The diversity of organisms, living and extinct, is the result of evolution					
		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>All life is directly descended from a <u>universal common ancestor</u> that was a simple one-celled organism.</li> <li>Over countless generations changes resulting from <u>natural diversity</u> within a <u>species</u> led to the <u>selection of individuals best suited to survive</u> under certain conditions</li> <li>Species not able to <u>respond sufficiently to changes in their environment</u> become extinct.</li> </ul>

Pupils should be taught to use the following practical scientific methods, processes and skills through the teaching of the programme of study content:

## Key Stage 1

- asking simple questions and recognising that they can be answered in different ways
- observing closely, using simple equipment
- performing simple tests
- identifying and classifying
- using their observations and ideas to suggest answers to questions
- gathering and recording data to help in answering questions

## Lower Key Stage 2

- asking relevant questions and using different types of scientific enquiries to answer them
- setting up simple practical enquiries, comparative and fair tests
- making systematic and careful observations and, where appropriate, taking accurate measurements using standard units, using a range of equipment, including thermometers and data loggers
- gathering, recording, classifying and presenting data in a variety of ways to help in answering questions
- recording findings using simple scientific language, drawings, labelled diagrams, keys, bar charts, and tables
- reporting on findings from enquiries, including oral and written explanations, displays or presentations of results and conclusions
- using results to draw simple conclusions, make predictions for new values, suggest improvements and raise further questions
- identifying differences, similarities or changes related to simple scientific ideas and processes
- using straightforward scientific evidence to answer questions or to support their findings.

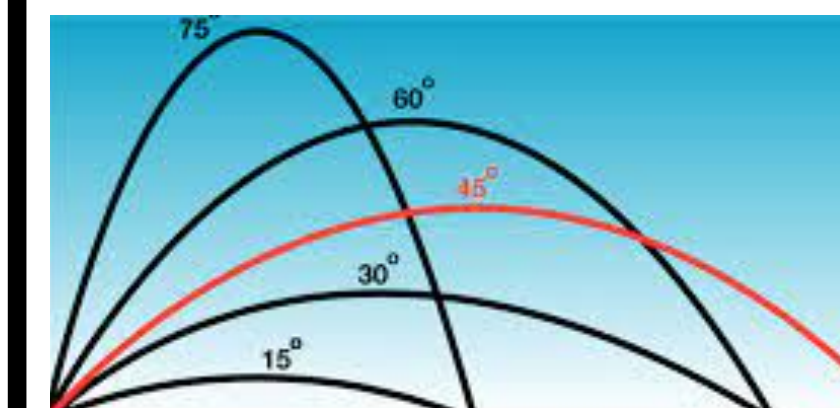

<p>Science is about finding the cause or causes of phenomena in the natural world</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Science is a search to explain and understand phenomena in the natural world.</li> <li>There is no single scientific method for doing this; the diversity of natural phenomena requires a diversity of methods and instruments to generate and test scientific explanations.</li> <li>Often an explanation derives from the factors that must be present for an event to take place, as shown by evidence from observations and experiments.</li> <li>In other cases, supporting evidence is based on correlations revealed by patterns in systematic observation.</li> </ul>		<p>Scientific explanations, theories and models are those that best fit the evidence available at a particular time</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>A scientific theory or model representing relationships between variables of a natural phenomenon must fit the observations available at the time, and lead to predictions that can be tested.</li> <li>Any theory or model is provisional and subject to revision in the light of new data, even though it may have led to predictions that accord with data in the past.</li> </ul>
