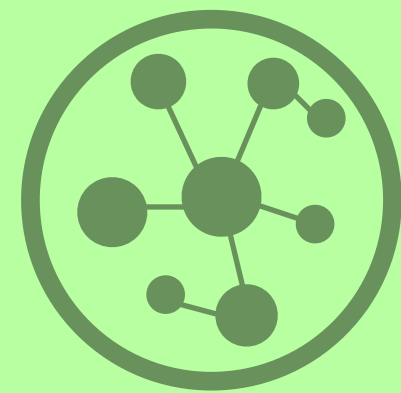




Information

Knowledge organised in a meaningful way - memories (emotional), concepts, knowledge

Second Order Concepts

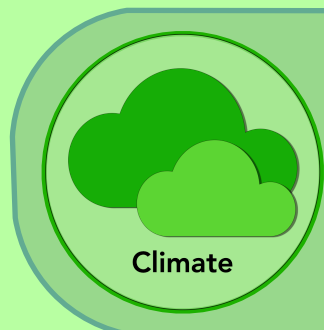
'The kinds of questions a Geographer asks'

Second-order concepts: these shape the key questions asked in a subject and organise the subject knowledge.



Key Concepts (Big Ideas)

Key concepts identify the content or focus areas of study

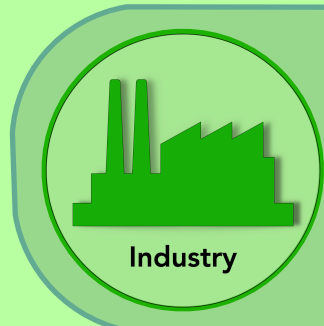


Climate

The average weather conditions in a certain place: temperatures, precipitation, etc.

Disaster

A major natural or man-made occurrence that causes widespread disruption to a region and/or a community.

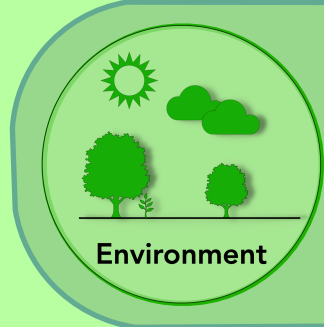
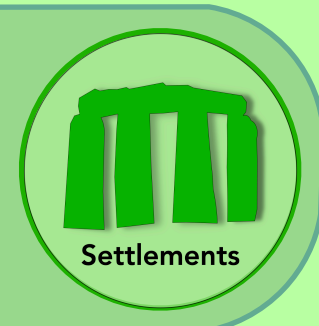


Industry

Businesses or factories that convert raw materials into goods or that provide useful services.

Settlements

A place where a group of people decide to live or gather together.



Environment

The surroundings or conditions that a living organism inhabits.

Trade

Buying, selling or swapping goods between people or countries.
